NOTES

Luman Gilbert (1785) was the son of Joseph Gilbert (1748-1813) and Miriam Hopkins (1755-1839); he is a brother of Elias Gilbert, early settler of Richmond. He was first married to Clarissa Noble in 1815; she was the daughter of Medad Noble and Lydia Frary. They were married in February and she died on June 4. He married the next year Eliza Ashley (1798-1823; the daughter of Noah Ashley and Elizabeth Sheldon. Their children were Clarissa (1818-1892; married Morris Henry); Lucy (1820-1893; unmarried); Joseph (1821-1904; married Mary Robinson); and Luman (1823-1911; married Fanny Robinson). Luman married a third time, to Nancy Batchellor in 1824. Their son Anson (1826) married Alice Wetmore. According to the obituary of Harriet Batchellor Noble, Nancy is also buried in Richmond Center Cemetery.

NOTES

Perrin and Lucinda lived in Naples in 1850, then in Richmond in 1855. I believe he died in Richmond, though some sources say Honeoye Falls. (Mixing it up with Honeoye?) *Livonia Gazette* March 6, 1891 – Mrs. Batcheller has gone to Lima to live with her daughter, Mrs. Amasa Plimpton.

<u>George Batchellor</u> (1833) lived in Richmond in 1860. His son <u>Fred</u> was born in 1867. George died between 1870 and 1880. His widow Frances and his son Fred lived in Richmond in 1880.

<u>Fred G. Batchellor</u> (1867) died April 19, 1944 in Geneseo; he was the father of Mrs. Fay Carpenter, Mrs. George Laidlaw, and William Batchellor. Mrs. Fred Batchellor (of Geneseo) died May 23, 1943 in Warsaw Hospital (she was born 1870 in Lima).

<u>Harriet Batchellor</u> (1835) died February 22, 1891. She died one week before her sister Mary. (See also the Noble family on 1810 Census.)

<u>Lucinda Batchellor</u> (1839) lived in Richmond. Her children (all born in Ontario County) were Jennie, 1861; Lizzie, 1863; and John, 1870 (died 1951). In 1891 she lived in Lima, when her mother came to live with her. She and Amasa moved to Honeoye Falls shortly afterward. (Census: 1880—Lima; 1891—Honeoye Falls; 1900—Honeoye Falls). She died October 29, 1895 and is buried in the Honeoye Falls Cemetery. See also Plimpton Family.

<u>Mary Batchellor</u> (1844) never married. She was a long time teacher at Honeoye Union School. She died of "quick consumption" on Tuesday March 3, 1891 after an illness of three months, at the age or nearly 47 years. She is buried in Lakeview Cemetery, by the side of her father who died in December (1890) and near the grave of her sister Mrs. Noble, who died a week earlier than Mary.

NOTES

Fayette Batchellor (1843) was born May 15, 1843 in Honeoye. He married Sarah Allison and had six children: Lizzie (1868-1961; m John Record), Charles (1870), Bertha (1872-1901; m Fred Carey), Miles (1876-1963), Roy (1880-1984), and Frederick (1886). He was an interior house painter; lived in Canandaigua, then in Shortsville where he died.

His obituary: "Fayette Batchellor died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John A. Record, Saturday evening, aged 90 years. He was born in Honeoye, May 15,1843. The survivors are four children, Mrs. John Record of Shortsville, Miles B Batchellor of Canandaigua, Roy W. and Fred C. Batchellor of Rochester; seven grandchildren, twelve great grandchildren and five great, great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Record, on Main street, Tuesday afternoon, Rev. A. J. MacMillan officiating. The burial was in Brookside cemetery. The services were in charge of Turner Schrader post, American Legion.

Mr. Batchellor was a member of Albert Murray Post, GAR, of Canandaigua, and was one of the last two survivors of old 13th Regiment that left Rochester, 3,000 strong. At an early age he went to Rochester where be learned the trade of interior decorating under Merritt Morgan. He was following that trade at the time of his enlistment, and also after he was mustered out of service, going to Canandaigua where he did this work for 43 years.

Mr. Batchellor enlisted in Rochester, in Company C of the 13th New York Volunteers and saw three years and nine months of service. After the first battle of Bull Run, Company C and Company K were consolidated. At the end of his first two year term of enlistment, the members of the regiment were returned to Rochester, where a banquet was held and other ceremonies were held. He then re-enlisted in Company C of the 16th New York Heavy Artillery, in which he continued until his discharge on August 21, 1865, in Washington.

He had the remarkable record of having fought in 21 battles and having received during that period but one slight gun shot wound. A bullet struck his gun stock, glanced and struck his cheek. After its removal at the army hospital he returned to the ranks and participated in the second battle of Bull Run, Gettysburg, Antietam, Spotsylvania, and the Seven Day battle before Richmond. He was captured at one time by the enemy, when he and several comrades were

acting as a scouting party, trying to determine the exact position of the Confederate Army and with the others of his party was started at once on the march to the prison at Richmond. During the first night out, while the guards were sleeping, he quietly crept from among them and succeeded in making good his escape." (Published: Clifton Springs Press May 22, 1933)

<u>Wesley Batchellor</u> (1845) was born in Honeoye. He married Mary _____ (. 1850) and had six children: Carl (1869), Dora (1872), Claudia (1874), Fayette (1876), Scott (1878), Wesley (1880-1887; died of diphtheria). He was in the Civil War, 6th Michigan Heavy Artillery. He was a house painter and lived in Michigan after 1878 (when his son Scott was born there). He died after 1894 (but before 1900), when he was listed on Michigan's Civil War vets in Schoolcraft Township (Kalamazoo co.).

<u>Charles Batchellor</u> (1847) served in the Civil War. He was a farm hand in 1870 for D.C. Sears in Bristol. He married Fanny about 1876 and lived in Richmond in 1880. In 1892 he was a mail carrier in Canandaigua. He and Fanny had Lizzie (1868), Truman (1870), Frank (1877) and Jennette (1881). He died June 14, 1913 in Canandaigua and is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery. Fanny died in December 1914, age sixty. She is also buried in Woodlawn.
